CAPTAIN HERMAN J. F. BOTTCHER 1909-1944

He never served in the Wisconsin National Guard. He was not from Wisconsin. In fact, he was not even born an American citizen. But no one in the Thirty-second Division was more highly respected as a soldier or regarded as an individual than Herman Bottcher.

Born in Germany, he fled to Australia in 1920 and arrived in San Francisco a few years later. In 1937 he began his life-long crusade against fascism by serving with the Loyalist Abraham Lincoln Brigade in Spain.


As a Staff Sergeant in Company H, 126th Infantry, Bottcher participated in the infamous march of the Second Battalion across the Owen Stanley Range. At Bung he led a small group of men through Japanese lines to set up a machine gun position on the beach. By holding this position against repeated suicidal attacks, Bottcher and his men were able to block the exchange of reinforcements and supplies between the village and mission. As a result of this action, Bottcher was awarded the first of his two Distinguished Service Crosses, and promoted to Captain. Several wounds also netted his first Purple Heart. Because of his wounds and malaria, he could have rotated home. But he elected to stay with the Division, and became commander of the Recon Troop. For the rest of his service he operated behind enemy lines. On the 30th of December, 1944, Captain Bottcher was killed in action. He was posthumously awarded a Silver Star for heroism.


